


# RAHSS Autumn Newsletter 2024

## **2024 Romsey Show Report**

For those of you who were able to attend the show, either in the capacity of an exhibitor, competitor, paying guest, sponsor or volunteer, on behalf of the Show Council I hope that you enjoyed your day, and we thank you for your support. We welcomed approximately 17,000 people to the show.

The Show was blessed with fine weather, not only on show day but also, and as importantly, in the week preceding the show, and in the week after during the take down period.

The show featured the return of the four in hand coaching class and marathon, with five immaculate teams keenly competing for the Chamberlayne Macdonald Cup. The competition featured the initial judging in the President's Main Ring, followed by a six mile marathon along private tracks within the Broadlands Estate, where they were observed for coach and horsemanship, followed by the final judging again in the President's Main Ring. The Chamberlayne Macdonald Cup, and a magnum of champagne was presented to the winner by The Countess of Lindsay. The winning exhibition team was led by Max White. Thank you to the Cranbury Foundation for supporting the Coaching class and marathon and to Winchester Bar Company for the Champagne.





Another unique feature was our marquee showcasing the build-up to D-Day within the local area, featuring six stands and a lecture area, which was so popular that there was standing room only! This was supplemented by a collection of WW2 vehicles from the military, agricultural and commercial sectors.



The cattle and sheep lines were well supported. The Supreme Beef Champion was a Charolais exhibited by Sarah Jackson from Goscombe Farm in Hampshire. The Senior Dairy Female Champion was awarded to Richard Norman from Somerset. Charmain Plummer from Dorset won the Overall Sheep Champion with her Dutch Spotted Sheep, whilst Nicole Farmer from Berkshire took the Reserve Champion place with her Oxford Down sheep. In the equine section from 17 champions, the Supreme Champion was awarded to Richard Burge

with Mynyddgraig Alarch and the Reserve Champion went to Gavina Semonella, exhibiting Forlan Honey Monarch. The Donkey Champion was Aria exhibited by Jade Weaver and the reserve place awarded to Mr Mclaren and Miss Chilton exhibiting East Lodge Orinoco. Finally, congratulations to the Heavy Horse Turnout winners Jon Mitchell and Charlotte Webb. There are so many championship winners of all the classes taking place on the day, it just isn't possible to list everyone! Congratulations to you all and thank you to all our livestock and equine exhibitors for supporting the Show along with the sponsors. A lot of time goes into preparing the animals for show day and we are so grateful to everyone that takes part on the day. We were pleased to welcome several newcomers to the showing world this year as well.

We had all the traditional favourites return to the Show this year including the falconry, gun dog and flyball displays in the RBC Brewin Dolphin Countryside Ring, as well as the popular

Family Dog Show. Other attractions included the BMX Stunt display ring, the Sheep Show, mobile farm, Scotty's Circus and we were also pleased to be able to welcome the Romsey Old Cadets, who bought their unique style of music playing and entertainment to the show.

The food zone was as popular as ever, with plenty of local produce, the Beggars Fair stage and picnic area, as well as Hampshire Fare's Skills Kitchen featuring the local chefs and producers, the honey tent and beautiful floral art displays.

# Junior Ambassador's Highlights by Lucy Houghton




"I want to start by saying what an absolute pleasure it was to be the Junior Ambassador of the Show this year! My Show started on the Thursday evening when I received my badge from Norton, the Chairman, and I helped set up for the Steward's supper. What was clear from this moment was firstly, how delicious the selection of Lyburn Cheese was, and secondly, the passion that everyone bought into the tent. The people who I spoke to had decades of experience amongst them, and we were all hopeful it would be a successful day — it felt lucky that that evening we were blessed with a bright rainbow across the whole site. Friday for me was a bit of a blur,

assisting with any handy jobs I could, from putting up fire exit signs in the shopping marquees to helping man the gates, but at least the sun shone throughout. I feel like it gave me a behind the scenes snapshot into the complexity of everything in takes for the Show to happen.

On Show Day I was on-site around 6.30am, dewy grass, sun slowly warming and excited to meet as many people as possible. Over the twelve hours of my day, I did around 13,000 steps which I think is quite impressive since most of the morning I was being driven around in the

luxury of the President's buggy as we toured around the Show through each of the zones. Whilst I won't describe every hour and step in detail, I've chosen my five highlights of the day to give you an insight into why I think it was my favourite Romsey Show in years.

- 1) I started my day with the Presidents and seeing all corners of the Show but the best start was having a stockman's breakfast behind the cattle lines and being able to get an insight into getting a showing animal ready. It was exciting to watch various cattle being made to look their best by blowing them with air, brushing them and even adding talc powder to them.
- 2) I loved sitting at the side of the Main Ring watching the beautiful horses' step in time and pull in a wonderful selection of coaches for us to watch. It was the first time in over 30 years that the coaching class was on display, and it really felt like a treat. The amount of effort that goes into an event like this was clear from the outfits of those sat on top of the carriages, to the shine of the coaches and the neatness of the horses. You could really imagine that you were back in time and waiting on your ride home from a ball.



- 3) As a fan of history and knowing that 80 years since the events of D-Day is a significant landmark, I was grateful to be able to attend the final talk of the day by Chris Barrington-Brown about the build-up to D-Day that happened around Romsey. It was fascinating to learn just how many troops there would have been marshalled in the fields and local towns that many of us know and to learn about what evidence is available through maps and photos.
- 4) It was a real privilege to be able to walk out into the Main Ring and take part in the sunset ceremony. The weather was gorgeous all day and the golden glow as the sun was going down really highlighted how lucky we were. We had WWII Military vehicles, standard bearers, a parade marshal and dignitaries giving a salute which gave the end of the Show a very honourable feel.
- 5) And lastly, overall, I thoroughly enjoyed talking to a range of people, but especially the parents of young families and a few young farmers about what they want from the Show. I really valued gathering everyone's ideas and I hope to continue to support the Show and see what happens in the future.

So, having read the above, I hope you will all agree it was a wonderful day and that if you came you also thoroughly enjoyed it! I look forward to helping to select the next Junior Ambassador and seeing what moments we can make happen in September 2025.
